FERPA

As required by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974, with certain exceptions, generally Temple University cannot disclose a student's educational records without the written consent of the student or without proof by the parent that the student is dependent on his/her parents for federal income tax purposes.



The procedures for exercising these rights are explained in "Temple University's Guidelines Pertaining to Confidentiality of Student Records," copies of which are available on Temple's website at <http://policies.temple.edu/ferpa>. Included in this policy is a description of the types and locations of educational records maintained by the university. If you or your students' primary or home language is not English, upon your request, reasonable efforts will be made to provide you with a translated copy of this "Annual Notice," as well as with "Temple University's Guidelines Pertaining to Confidentiality of Student Records."

Please note that, in compliance with a 1997 federal statute designed to advance military recruiting, Temple may release dates of birth to the military unless the student notifies Temple that he or she wishes this information withheld.

FERPA Waiver

A student may consent to the release of information from education records to parents, guardians or other appropriate persons. The student may provide the university with their consent by completing the FERPA waiver online via TUPortal:

Student Health Services strives to promote a high standard of health among Temple University students through programs in preventive medicine and health education, in addition to diagnosis and treatment of injury and illness. Care providers include doctors, nurse practitioners, and nurses. Services offered at the Main, Ambler and Health Science campuses include basic medical care, an immunization/ allergy injection clinic, family planning services, nutritional consultation, HIV testing and a self-care center.

How does my student make an urgent or same day appointment?

1. Many appointments can now be made on our website. Students can logon to My Online Student Health by going to www.temple.edu/studenthealth and clicking on the top right-hand side of the home

page, then using their accessnet username and password (these are the same credentials you use to log into their Temple Email account).
 2. Students can call Student Health Services to schedule an appointment. Clearly state the urgent nature of your problem. A limited number of ▶

Urgent Same Day appointments will be given out over the phone. The best time to call is between 8:30 to 9:30 am.

- Students can walk in to the Student Health Center and be evaluated by a nurse. Walk-in patients are seen on a first come, first serve basis. After the evaluation the Nurse will determine whether appointments with a Physician or Nurse Practitioner are appropriate. There are a limited number of appointments available each day.

How does my student make a routine or future appointment on Main Campus?

Students can call (215) 204-7500 to set up routine or future appointments. Examples of future or routine appointments include:

We help students realize their role in maintaining campus civility through educational programming and sanctioning as well as through the participants on our student conduct boards.

If your student does go through disciplinary action, The Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards will not contact you directly if your student is charged with a violation of the Student Conduct Code, however, your student will be encouraged to speak with you about the incident and to include you in the pre-hearing and hearing process.

You will be notified in writing if your student is found responsible for

violating any provision/section of the University Drug and Alcohol Policy.

The Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards will be able to share specific case information with you if your student has waived his/her FERPA rights. If the FERPA rights have not been waived the office staff will be able to speak with you about disciplinary procedures, but will not be able to share specific case information with you.

Parents and guardians are welcome to participate in the student conduct process as advisors/support for your student(s). Parents and guardians are permitted to attend all hearings and meetings associated with the conduct process at your student's request. ■

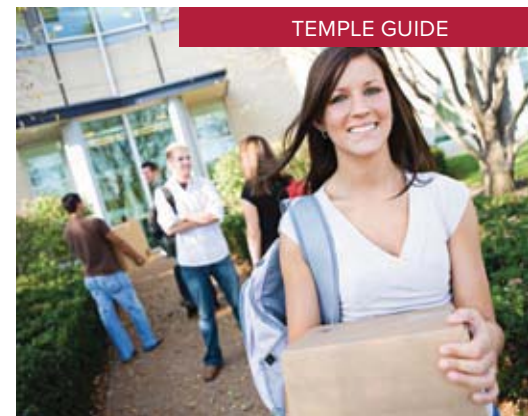
Housing Extension Requests

About the University

With more than 35,000 students and 17 schools and colleges, Temple University is a world-class comprehensive research and teaching university. Located midway between New York City and Washington, D.C., Temple offers a broad range of academic programs that attract students from every state in the United States and from more than 100 foreign nations.

The university has more than 3,200 full-time and part-time faculty members, many with national and international reputations. It is one of the top 100 institutions doing research for the federal government and has one of only three university-based national survey research facilities in the nation.

Temple offers bachelor's degrees in more than 130 fields, master's degrees in 121 and doctoral degrees in 56. The university also offers programs in seven (7) first professional degree areas.

A member of the Pennsylvania Commonwealth System of Higher Education, Temple University is governed by a 36-member Board of Trustees. The university's primary sources of support are an annual appropriation from the commonwealth and student tuition. Ann Weaver Hart is the university's ninth president.

Follow I-676 approximately 1 mile to Central Phila./Broad Street exit. Take Broad Street exit (stay to left). In one block go left onto Broad Street. Follow Broad Street to Cecil B. Moore (approx. 2 miles). Turn right onto Cecil B. Moore and right again onto Park Ave. Visitors Parking Lot 3 entrance is on right. You may also park at the Liacouras Center Parking Garage, located at 15th Street and Montgomery Avenue.

From the Northeast Extension Pennsylvania Turnpike:
Take Exit 20 to I-476 South to I-76. Exit at I-76 East (approx. 5 miles). Take I-76 East approx. 15 miles to Exit 344 (Central Philadelphia)-676) Note: Exit is on left. Follow directions from I-676 above.

From I-95 North:
Take Exit 22 (Central Philadelphia)-676). Follow Central Philadelphia signs to Broad Street exit. At next intersection (Vine Street) turn left. In one block, turn left onto Broad Street. Follow Broad Street to Cecil B. Moore (approx. 2 miles). Turn right onto Cecil B. Moore and right again onto Park Ave. Visitors Parking Lot 3 is on right. You may also park at the Liacouras Center Parking Garage, located at 15th Street and Montgomery Avenue.

From I-95 South:
Take Exit 22 (Central Philadelphia)-676). Note: left lane exit. I-676 West to Broad Street exit. See above directions from Broad Street exit.

From the New Jersey Turnpike:
Take Exit 4 to route 73 North. Approx. 1 mile to Route 38 West. Follow for 5 1/2 miles to Benjamin Franklin Bridge. Take I-676 West to Broad Street exit. Follow above directions from Broad Street exit.

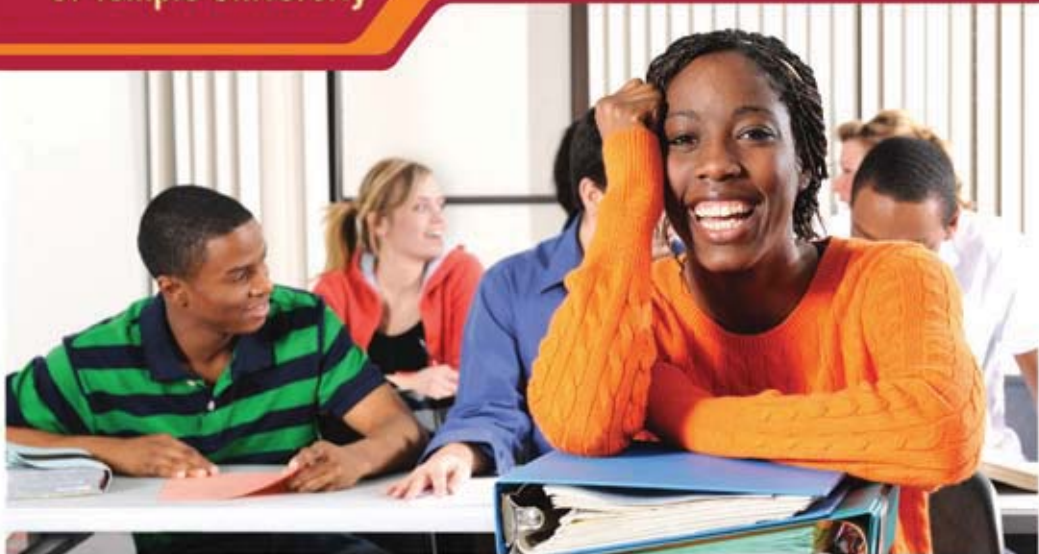
